Bishop's Column

From the 'listening meetings' carried out across the Diocese over twelve months ago, the two most recurring themes were a call for more opportunity for Adult Formation and for a greater involvement in areas of Participation and Decision making. Both are themes that the Synod 2021-2024 also discussed and reported in the Final Document, -a document which could be your summer reading in preparation for parish and Diocesan discussions in the early autumn. <u>Synod-Synodality-Final-Doc-ENG.pdf</u>

The Final document from the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops, dated 26th October 2024, outlines propositions aimed at fostering a more synodal Church. It emphasises transparency, accountability, and the active participation of all Church members seeking to harmonise decision making and expand lay roles in ecclesiastical life. The main ideas focus on the theme of, *For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, and Mission.*

At the heart of Synodality is the role of the Holy Spirit in calling the Church towards conversion and unity, rooted in a sacramental understanding of the people of God. Synodality is a journey marked by spiritual unity and with a sense of shared mission among all members of the Church. At the heart of Synodality is the listening to the call of the Holy Spirit voiced in Church teaching and in the informed reflections of all the faithful.

Synodal conversion calls each person to enlarge the space of their heart, the heart being the first place where all our relationships resonate, grounded in each believer's personal relationship with Jesus Christ and His Church.

Pastoral action cannot be limited to tending to relationships between people who already feel attuned to one another but rather encourage the encounter between all men and women. (110)

Formation is needed to help the People of God realise the call of every baptised person to exercise the charism with which they were endowed at baptism.

In the Christian community, all the Baptised are enriched with gifts to share, each according to his or her vocation and way or condition of life. (57)

They ask that their commitment be recognised for what it is: Church action in light of the Gospel, and not merely a personal choice. Lastly, they ask the community to accompany those who, through their witness, have been drawn to the Gospel.(59)

Shared synodal formation for all the Baptised constitutes the horizon within which to understand and practise the specific formation required for individual ministries and vocations. (147)

It is with this in mind that I strongly encourage participation in the Catholic Pastoral Leadership course run by Liverpool Hope University (*see page 6*) or any of the pastoral theology or bible study courses run by our institutions. If a parish chose to organise for itself a series of talks or study sessions it would answer some of the questions and needs that are in the mind of your own community. If you do the local planning and organisation I will provide the speakers or leaders.

On the matter of consultation, leadership and decision making I bring to your notice the need for Foundation

Governors for our schools, (see 'Spotlight', p 7) as well as volunteers to be part of the Diocesan commissions and other bodies.

The Baptised participate in decision-making, accountability and evaluation processes through institutional structures, primarily through those already provided for the local Church set out in the existing Code of Canon Law. ... these are: Diocesan Synod ... Presbyteral Council ... Diocesan Pastoral Council ... Parish Pastoral Council ... Diocesan and Parish Finance Council. Members participate on the basis of their ecclesial role and their differentiated responsibilities and capacities (charisms, ministries, experiences, competencies, etc).(103)

And this brings us back to the place and importance of formation –

Formation is needed in order to engage in decisionmaking processes grounded in ecclesial discernment and which reflect a culture of transparency, accountability, and evaluation. The formation required is not only technical; it also needs to explore theological, biblical and spiritual foundations. (80)

These and many other themes are to be worked on by the Church between now and October 2028 when there will be a celebratory 'ecclesial assembly in the Vatican.'

Not a new Synod as might have been the case (one every three years), but a focus of the consolidation of the path taken so far from this Synod on Synodality.

In this monthly reflection. St Beuno's Outreach invites you to pray with an image and a verse of Scripture or other material.

Take time to ponder the painting: the three figures; the background detail; the atmosphere that is invoked. Notice what strikes you. Mary and Martha have become classic figures in Church representing different styles of life – the active and the contemplative – but in most cases a balance between the two is necessary.

As you settle to pray with these words, relax your body and mind to be attentive to the presence of God within you and all around you. Breathe in God's love and life and ask the Spirit to pray within you.

Then take a moment to consider this familiar story, perhaps with the painting alongside.

How does Jesus seem to be? Is he relaxed or anxious?

What about the two sisters? Do you identify with one rather than other? Why is that?

As you consider the scene, notice Jesus's words about 'the good portion'. What might that 'good portion' be in your own life?

What do you treasure? What do you wish should not to be taken from you in your own relationship with the Lord?

Martha and Mary offer hospitality to Jesus, and he is our guest too. Does he seem to want frenetic service? What might he really want from us?

Take a moment now to think of other people – perhaps your family, your friends, those you work with. How do you welcome them?

Do you listen attentively?

Take some moments of quiet to sit silently at Jesus's feet now, and, then speak to him from your heart. Maybe he has something to say to you?

End your prayer by asking the Lord to help you see him today in all those you meet.

This month we remember three people whom Jesus counted as special friends – Mary, Martha and Lazarus of Bethany, a village less than two miles from Jerusalem. The Church observes the feast of Mary, Martha and Lazarus on 29 July, while the Gospel at Mass on the Sixteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time (20 July) tells of an occasion when the sisters Mary and Martha welcomed Jesus to their home.

This image of Christ in the house of Martha and Mary (1886) is now in the Russian Museum, St. Petersburg. The painter is the Polish artist Henryk Siemiradzki (1843-1902), born and educated in Kharkiv, in what is now Ukraine.

Later he studied painting in St Petersburg and Munich, before moving to Rome where he set up his own studio. Some of his best-known works are scenes from the New Testament. Here Martha is seen at work in the background while Jesus and Mary enjoy a conversation in the sunlight.

Participating in Jesus' Prayer. Key events in Jesus' life take place in the context of his prayer: his baptism (Luke 3:21), the calling of the twelve (6:12-130 Peter's confession (9:18-20), and the Transfiguration (9:28-29). Thus –

prayer was the central act of the person of Jesus and, indeed . . . [he] is constituted by the act of prayer, of unbroken communication with the one he calls "Father". If this is the case, it is only possible really to understand this person by entering into this act of prayer, by participating in it . . . Therefore a participation in the mind of Jesus, i.e., in his prayer . . . is not some kind of pious supplement to reading the Gospels, adding nothing to knowledge of him or even being given an obstacle to the rigorous purity of critical knowing. On the contrary, it is the basic precondition if real understanding . . . is to take place . . . The person who prays begins to see.

Assisted Dying. - The next steps in Wales

The Welsh Parliament (Senedd) has been told that the Welsh NHS will only help terminally ill people with assisted dying if the <u>Senedd agrees</u> to it first.

Last year the Senedd, which oversees law on healthcare, rejected assisted dying, 26 to 19.

Seeds of Peace and Hope

The theme of the 20th World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation 2025

Pope Francis chose the theme this year:

"Seeds of Peace and Hope".

This ecumenical initiative is becoming customary and takes place from 1st September (Feast of St Francis of Assisi) to 4th October. In this Jubilee year, the tenth anniversary of the publication of the Encyclical *Laudato si'*, *Isaiah* 32:14-18 has been chosen as the Biblical reference text for this initiative. The Magisterium of Pope Francis and his recent predecessors, emphasised the close link between peace and care for creation (cf. Messages for the 1990 and 2010 World Day of Peace). Similarly, there is a very close connection between war and violence on the one hand, and degradation of the common home and waste of resources (destruction and armaments) on the other.

The Message urges prayer for the creation of the conditions for peace, a lasting and jointly built peace that inspires hope. The metaphor of the seed indicates the need for long-term commitment. Good practices and seeds of peace and hope from different continents are illustrated in the message.

Liverpool Hope University has partnered with several Catholic dioceses across England and Wales to help people like you to gain fresh perspectives on Scripture and Church teaching. You will look at real-world issues in the light of our tradition and consider the best ways of exploring Christian faith and life with others.

You will take 4 modules over 2 years:

- The Word of God
- The Synodal Church
- Dimensions of Christian Life

FOUNDATION GOVERNORS

The new school year in September begins a new term of appointment for Foundation Governors. "In the Spotlight" guides those who have not held the post before, and might consider if they can serve the Diocese and the schools in this way.



What is a Foundation Governor?

A Foundation Governor is appointed in the name of the Bishop and together form the majority of the governing body of a Catholic school. They have a legal duty to preserve and develop the Catholic character of the school and to ensure that the school is conducted in accordance with its trust deed; some will be parents of children currently in the school, but not all.

THE ROLE OF THE GOVERNING BOARD

Do I fit the criteria?

As a Governing Board, the overarching responsibility is to ensure that the school complies with the legal and canonical duty to ensure that its Catholic character is preserved and developed..

Foundation Governors are required, as the cornerstone of their role, to ensure this objective is achieved.

Governing boards have three core functions:

1. Ensuring clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction;

2. Holding executive leaders to account for the educational performance of the organisation and its pupils, and the performance management of staff; and

3. Overseeing the financial performance of the organisation and making sure its money is well spent.

The ministry of Foundation Governor is important, because the Catholic character of our schools depends on committed Catholics being willing to undertake this service. Foundation Governors will consider not only the interests of the School, but the interests of other Catholic Schools and of Catholic education throughout the diocese. The Bishop is therefore very appreciative of all those who offer to assist him in this vital task.

Responsibilities and Time Commitments

The average Foundation Governor role will take up about 6-10 hours per month. However, this can vary depending on the school calendar or by events, such as an Estyn inspection.

This commitment includes the minimum requirement of attending three full governor meetings per year and serving on at least one committee.

The committees will focus on areas such as finance, curriculum, pupil progress, mission and witness and site management.

You will also be encouraged to attend training sessions.

Because of our baptism, all Christians are all called to serve the Church's mission. So lack of experience is no bar to appointment, because all that is required is a wish to serve the mission of the Church in this way. Induction and training will be provided.

General Criteria

1. To become or remain a foundation governor, a person must be, and remain:

* a practising Catholic;

*providing education for his or her own children, if of school age, in a Catholic school/college (unless exceptional circumstances apply);

*able to give priority of attendance at meetings of the governing body to ensure representation of the Bishop;

*in possession of a valid DBS disclosure certificate.

2. To become or remain a foundation governor, a person must not be disqualified in accordance with:

*the current School Government Regulations;

*the Charities Acts; and

*the Criminal Justice and Court Services Act 2000.

Specific Criteria

3. In respect of the school for which a person is or is to be a foundation governor, he or she must not at any time be:

*related to any member of the school staff, teaching or non-teaching; *related to any governor whether elected, appointed or *ex-officio*, of the school;

*employed (whether as a teacher or otherwise) at the school.

4. A person (other than the parish priest) will not normally be reappointed as a foundation governor of a particular school or college if he or she has just completed three consecutive terms on that particular governing body.

Termination of Office

If criterion 2 ceases to apply during the term of office of a governor, the term of office comes to an end automatically by operation of law. Should criteria 1 or 4 cease to apply to a foundation governor during his or her tenure of office, the governor would be expected to offer his or her resignation to the Ordinary.

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PROPOSAL TO REORGANISE THE CATHOLIC EDUCATION PROVISION IN FLINTSHIRE

Within Flintshire there are six schools that are categorised as English-medium Voluntary Aided Catholic schools:

- •St Anthony's Catholic Voluntary Aided Primary School, Saltney.
- •St David's Catholic Voluntary Aided Primary School, Mold
- St Mary's Catholic Voluntary Aided Primary School, Flint.
- •St Winefride's Catholic Voluntary Aided Primary School, Holywell.
- •Venerable Edward Morgan Catholic Voluntary Aided Primary School, Shotton.
- •St Richard Gwyn Catholic Voluntary Aided High School, Flint.

Following the regulatory guidance of the School Organisation Code 2018, the Catholic Diocese of Wrexham and Flintshire County Council wish to consult interested parties regarding a proposal to reorganise the Catholic education provision in Flintshire.

It is proposed to:

Close St Anthony's Catholic VA Primary School in Saltney by 31 August 2026.

- •Amalgamate St David's Catholic VA Primary School in Mold, St Mary's Catholic VA Primary School in Flint and St Richard Gwyn Catholic VA High School in Flint.
- •Amalgamation would see the individual schools close by 31 August 2026 and a new amalgamated English medium 3-18 Catholic Voluntary Aided school, with a new name and school number, opened in September 2026, operating over the three current sites.
- Move the new school to the new buildings from 01 September 2029.

This consultation commenced 03 June 2025. It closes at Midnight on 18 July 2025.
